### 2019 Report

2019 was a hugely successful, productive year for the Hatch-Barnwell Charitable Trust, as all the schools in Serpong and Sulawesi and the clinic in Lombok were all fully functional, as expected. Despite the many challenges faced in 2018, we are delighted to report that the works for the Secondary school, being constructed in Serpong were completed by October 2019, therefore schooling a lot of the children who were previously unable to attend.

### Serpong

Due to the terrible weather conditions and torrential rain during the summer season, which incidentally was over the exam period and totally unexpected, unfortunately the primary school flooded and as you can imagine caused major destruction to the works. Not only that, but again due to the weather, many people were sick and either couldn't sit their exams or even where they could, the results were not as good as the children and their parents would have hoped for. Due to the overrunning works, hence the delay in opening the Secondary school, the attendance figures were not as vast as we would have hoped, however the target for next year is to increase that number significantly. Now that the school is complete, the intention is to plant some trees outside the entrance of the school and improve the carbon footprint as well sheltering the school children during their break, from the sun.

#### Aceh

Just as last year, the nursery school is still being maintained well and doing very well on the whole. We always hope to receive a proposal for a possible further Primary school in the near future, but feel that there may be some way to go before this happens due to the laid-back nature of the people of Aceh.

#### Bali

We are delighted to report that the approach that BuTitik took last year, where she consulted parents to help them raise more money, so that their children were free to attend school worked very well! By the Hatch-Barnwell Trust sponsoring entire families rather than just the children, this meant that more children attended school and as a result are receiving a much a better education, helping their overall future in the long-run. We are very aware that BuTitik devotes her time and energy to this great cause and the children, so would like to acknowledge that we are all very grateful to her and appreciate her work, well done, long may the good work continue.

### **Gunung Kidul**

During the last visit to the school, the trustees looked into and then reviewed the proposal for the extension work and agreed that the trust would undertake the work required, to cater for more children. As mentioned, the work will go ahead this year as planned. The children, who arrived from Sulawesi after the tsunami in 2018, have settled in well, despite some of them losing their parents and families. We are so happy to assist in this process.

### **Padang**

Since last year, Asni came to the UK to study English in September 2019 and will be sitting her IELTS exam in May 2020. We hope that this opportunity enables her to better her future prospects and wish Asni the very best of luck for her upcoming exams.

Although Bu Farida is coping well in Padang, she is looking forward to having Asni back to help and hopes that her improved English will enable her to teach English to the local children. Sadly we lost one of our pupils who attended the school through a terrible accident. We appreciate Bu Farida's efforts, who spent time with the family helping them through this difficult time, but also made time for the other children at school. On a happier note, the other children at the school are all doing very well and we hope that this continues to be the case.

#### Lombok

The trust has had a lot of experience building schools over the last few years, however, after the terrible earthquake that devastated the people of Lombok, we felt we would like to help and built our first medical clinic in 2019, in the small village near Rinjani Mountain. Many of the residents are elderly and frail and so can't easily make their way to the town centre to get the crucial help they need. By building our clinic with the basic equipment required, it enables them to get the essential treatment they need for everyday ailments such as diarrhea, diabetes or malaria. We have arranged with the local puskesmas to send a nurse to the clinic once a week, to assist the elderly community. If this requires an overnight stay, we make sure that we have provisions to provide this care for them. If after diagnosis, the patient needs to be hospitalised or transported to the hospital by ambulance, the trust will provide for this also. We hope in the future, to build on this help by providing potential exercise classes or other possible activities for the community.
